Planting trees to reduce our emissions

We planted around 2,000 new trees in Boroondara in the 2022-23 financial year. This included the 1,000 trees we commit to planting every year, as well as an additional 1.000 trees we promised to plant in the last financial year as an action of our Climate Action Plan.

Here in Junction Ward and surrounds, this included:

- around 200 new trees in Hawthorn
- around 110 new trees in Hawthorn East
- around 200 new trees in Camberwell
- around 110 new trees in Canterbury.

Young trees, whether planted on your nature strip by Council, or in your own backyard, will always benefit from a little extra attention.

Water it: We water new trees in public spaces to help them get established in their new home. To check whether your new trees need watering, feel the

soil just below the laver of mulch if the soil is dry, the tree should be watered.

Mind the bark: When mowing and using line trimmers, avoid contact with a tree's bark. Bark helps protect trees from pests and diseases, and damaging it can cause serious harm, especially to young trees.

Give it space: Avoid parking cars too close to a tree or storing heavy machinery or materials beneath the canopy to ensure the soil doesn't compact and oxygen can reach the roots. For young trees, try to leave 2 metres of clear space around them.

Report it: Help us care for our street trees by letting us know if there are issues with a tree's health and reporting any acts of vandalism via our easy online form at: service.boroondara.vic. gov.au/report-an-issue

Don't let your recycling go to waste

Using your bins correctly means valuable resources can be recovered. When the wrong items go into your kerbside bins, this contaminated waste ends up in landfill. Read on for some tips on what can and can't go in each of your bins.

What can go in your yellow-lidded recycling bin

- aluminium cans, trays and foil (roll foil into a loose ball)
- steel cans
- glass bottles and jars
- paper and cardboard (flattened is best)
- rigid household plastic bottles and containers, including milk bottles, detergent bottles and yoghurt tubs.

Top tip: you can leave lids and labels on all bottles and jars.

What can go in your lime greenlidded FOGO bin

- all food waste (except teabags, many of which have plastic linings)
- garden waste
- AS4736 certified compostable liners
- paper towel and tissues.

Top tip: be sure to remove all stickers and rubber bands from fruit and vegetables.

What can go in your dark green or red-lidded household waste bin

- nappies (including compostable and biodegradable nappies)
- vacuum dust
- broken glassware and crockery
- compostable and biodegradable packaging.

There are some items that can't go in any bin. These can be disposed of at Council's waste facilities.

- E-waste (anything with a battery, cord or plug) and building or renovation materials can be taken to the Boroondara Recycling and Waste Centre.
- Paint and chemicals can be disposed of via Sustainability Victoria's 'Detox Your Home' program.
- Medical waste like sharps can be disposed of in sharps containers collected from Council's Camberwell Office.

Mowing our open spaces

With spring fast approaching, we'd like to remind community members about our mowing schedule for Council-managed land in Boroondara.

Between September and April, our team mows more than 470 sites every week or fortnight. These range from parks, reserves, gardens and sportsgrounds, through to traffic islands and some car parks.

Please be aware that wet weather may impact this schedule, as it can result in:

- · grass growing faster than usual
- open spaces becoming too wet to mow safely
- a backlog of locations we need to mow once the weather improves.

Mowing large areas of open space also requires heavy mowing equipment which can damage surfaces if used on wet ground.

If we have not mown a site due to these conditions, we will continue to check it until it is dry and stable enough for our staff to safely proceed.
